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

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

In our first uninterrupted school year in two years, I've been incredibly proud to watch all our students and staff return to campus and breathe life back into our learning environment with such enthusiasm, determination, and positivity.

The pandemic taught us many things and touched us in many ways. Perhaps most importantly it has proven to us that in the face of adversity, resilience and courage flourish.

The School celebrates its Centenary in 2024. Perhaps the lessons we have learned through the pandemic have similarities to those learned in the Strathcona community during the times of the Great Depression and the War years.

We have had over 10 terms of disrupted, and often remote learning. Our students had to draw deep to cultivate important life skills that many individuals don't develop until well into adulthood. They have been creative, self-directed, determined, adaptive, resilient, and showed positive spirit through all the ups and downs.

I believe these qualities will provide them with a strong foundation to face and withstand the vicissitudes that life – inevitably - will throw at them as they move through the years that follow this.

In strong, high functioning communities adversity tends to bring people together, drawing out the best in human nature and leading to deeper human connection. Now that we are sharing the same campuses again and a more normal life, our sense of community, connection, and caring for one another has never seemed stronger or more important. This is represented beautifully in the huge number of attendees who participated in our events, and the volume of students who participated in co-curricular activities this year.

Our community event program attendance has never been stronger. Well over 2000 guests have enjoyed 117 parent and alumnae events Strathcona has held throughout the year. Record numbers have attended our Art Shows, Alumnae Reunions, Strathcona Family Association Events, Women Network Series, Centre for Learning Future Events and Sport celebrations, not to mention strong attendance at our various arts performances.

The strength of our community; the value we place on education; and our community's dedication of service to others, was made apparent through this year's Annual Appeal. This was the launch of giving to create the Innagural Centenary Scholarship. I thank you sincerely for the generosity shown in donations, and we hope through further donations, we will be able to offer the opportunity to provide a Strathcona education to a young woman whose family would not normally have the means to attend.

It was also another impressive year

of awards for Strathcona with Strathcona teachers recognised individually on a national basis. There are too many to name, but we are proud that The Educator named our Junior School as one of Australia's most innovative schools, and our Year 9 Program was awarded The Best Use of Technology for Envision. In addition, the Envision Program also won the Prestigious Wade Institute Award, testament to how innovative and impactful this program is in teaching life ready skills to students. We can add to this the many invitations extended to our teaching and professional staff to contribute to conferences, media and publications.

As we close out the year, now is the time to focus on the future and the wealth of possibilities that a new year promises us. Most importantly we will continue to nurture a community of learning and a culture of belonging. As Helen Keller once said, "Alone we can do so little; together we can do so much." This perfectly encapsulates the importance of community, participation and why connectedness is the fabric that drives us to accomplish what we could not do alone. While we did manage to cope alone in our homes in the lockdowns, we have learned that connection and community deepen our sense of shared humanity and enriches our experience of life.

"Perseverance and resilience are of course important, yet the skill I valued most was learning to feel comfortable with failure."



Governance and Corporate Structure



- » Approval of the appointment of the Principal and performance appraisals of the Principal


The day-to-day management of the School rests with the Principal and her staff. The Board comprises of up to 15 members. Some are current parents and some are past students or parents of past students.

STUDENT OUTCOMES NAPLAN RESULTS

NAPLAN (National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy) assesses students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in numeracy and literacy. The information gained from this testing provides feedback to families and the School on how students are performing in both literacy and numeracy at one specific point in time. This feedback is also able to be compared against State benchmarks.

Overall, Strathcona students performed exceptionally well in the NAPLAN tests with their average scores being consistently higher than the average student score in the State. The data also reinforces and supports the work that our teaching staff continue to do in the classroom to support each of our students that are working at differing levels within varying classrooms.

The following graphs show the results of Strathcona Girls Grammar in 2022 compared with the rest of the State.








YEAR 3 NAPLAN 2022




YEAR 5 NAPLAN 2022


