Throughout this remarkable year, our School continued to embody our motto: Fortiter, Fideliter, Feliciter - Bravely, Faithfully, Happily.

As a proudly non-selective girls' school, we remain committed to a personalised education that nurtures the whole student. Intellectual curiosity, physical vitality, social responsibility, and spiritual depth are all cultivated within a culture of high expectations and deep care. In every learning space, from our heritage buildings to our newest innovation hubs, Strathcona beats with energy, optimism, and vision.

Demand for enrolments has remained strong across all year levels, with particular growth in our Early Learning and Junior School. Our CRICOS registration for international students has further strengthened our secondary program, bringing global diversity to our campus. These numbers reflect not just interest, but trust and partnership with families who seek an education that balances academic achievement with a wealth of opportunities and healthy emotional and physical development.

Our academic results continue to shine. In 2024, our VCE students once again achieved outstanding outcomes, with several placing in the top one per cent of the state and achieving eight perfect scores and four Premier's Awards. Just as significant, however, is our recognition that success takes many forms. That is why we proudly introduced the VCE Vocational Major (VM) and the Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC), offering broader post-school options as required and celebrating all pathways with equal respect. At Strathcona, we aim to foster a learning culture where every student is seen, known, and empowered to reach their version of excellence and success.

2024 also saw the completion of our biophilic, award-winning Early Years Campus designed to foster calm, creativity, and connection to the natural world, it symbolises the future of early learning. Meanwhile, our digital infrastructure and flexible learning environments continue to evolve to meet the demands of personalised, future-focused education.

This year, we were honoured to be named by The Educator as one of Australia's Most Innovative Schools. The launch of our Floresco Philosophy, underpinning our new award-winning Early Years Campus, positions us at the forefront of holistic education. Floresco, meaning "to flourish," reflects our belief that children thrive when learning is explored through play, discovery, wonder, and a sense of belonging. From our youngest learners to our graduating class, wellbeing and learning are inextricably linked, embodying our ethos, which we call Wholebeing.

Our curriculum is designed to promote curiosity and is anchored in purpose. Future fluency is embedded across every discipline, equipping girls with the critical thinking, ethical reasoning, and life skills needed in a complex world. Our approach ensures students are not only prepared for assessments, but also for the complexity and responsibility of life beyond school.

And they do so within a dynamic culture of excellence, supported by passionate and dedicated educators engaged in extensive and targeted professional learning.

Aligned with our commitment to personalised learning, Strathcona provides a diverse range of academic and co-curricular opportunities that support individual growth and meaningful engagement. Whether students are drawn to the sciences. the humanities, the arts, music or sport, they are supported in pursuing their interests, challenging themselves, and developing the skills necessary for success in a complex and evolving world. Our Outdoor Education program, which spans from Year 1 to Year 10, offers challenge-by-choice opportunities that foster resilience, independence, and teamwork. From Sport to Music, Dance to Drama, Debating to STEM clubs and so much more, every Strathcona student has the opportunity to find what inspires them and pursue it wholeheartedly.

But perhaps what makes Strathcona most unique is its powerful sense of belonging. We are a school where every student is known by name, where differences are embraced, and where voices are valued. In 2024, we celebrated our long-standing commitment to inclusion, particularly through our support of our Deaf and Hard of Hearing students, enabled by the Beth Maclaren Smallwood Foundation, an initiative established by a remarkable alumna. Her legacy is a living example of what it means to give back and lift others as part of our Strathy spirit.

One of the defining moments of 2024 was the way our Centenary year brought the Strathcona community together across generations. From alumnae and parents to staff and our youngest students, the celebrations fostered a profound sense of shared legacy and belonging. Signature events including our 100th Foundation Day, the Centenary Diamond Gala Dinner, the ceremonial opening of a time capsule, the unveiling of our centenary sculpture *The Conversation*, the launch of our pictorial history *A Century of Memories – A Future of*

Promise, and our Centenary Evening Under the Stars, offered distinct reflections on our rich heritage and bold aspirations for the future.

Our staff culture remains one of our great strengths. High retention rates, vibrant collaboration, and a collective commitment to growth underpin our professional community. Sincere thanks to both Rob and Michael for their outstanding service and contribution to the fabric and soul of the school.


While much of the year was spent celebrating the past 100 years, the Board has also been looking forward to the next 100 years, and this year started work on the 2026–2031 Strategic Plan.

2024 STUDENT ATTENDANCE

Student attendance is tracked daily and logged electronically in our database. Parents can report absences through our online portal. If a student's absence is unexplained, an initial SMS is sent to parents, followed by further communication from the student's classroom teacher, Head of Year, or Head of House if required. During extended absences, classroom teachers, Heads of Year, and Heads of House, work closely with parents to provide support.

The average student attendance rate from Prep to Year 12 in 2024 was 92.92%.



"I was asked to reflect on how this school has shaped me as a person, and for someone who signed up for too many extra-curriculars as a Year 7, this could go many different directions."



Whilst all are equally significant and are very much a part of who I am today, when posed the question 'how has Strathcona shaped me as a person?' I believe it is best fit to devote my answer towards the appreciation and understanding of why education is as important as it is. Yes, an education opens the pathways onto university and independence, but it also gives us the ability to see inequalities within the world and to feel the need to create change.

It can be hard to fathom how very few girls get the same opportunities we have, how entering a space where the words 'Girls Unstoppable' being plastered on the walls may seem almost utopic for those halfway across the world. In fact, the Taliban's recent criminalisation of girls simply speaking in public would have this very article deemed as radical and wicked.

And so, it baffles me... that a place like Strathcona — somewhere that every day we crack jokes, create new works of art and write stories, a place of shared passion, light and connection — can be providing us with these vehicles of knowledge. Strathcona opened our perspectives which maybe even sparked a small fire in our hearts, which will hopefully motivate us to one day rewrite these workings of our world.

Indeed, the light of Strathcona's culture is something I will be eternally grateful to have been a part of. I have no doubt leaving this school will be a challenge. For the past six years Strathcona has displayed an ability to foster and promote all possibilities in the one location. The school on the hill, where those who love to perform can become any character they would like, our public speakers can compete and debate, or where our volleyball and water polo teams can train.

In our small pocket of Canterbury (and Hawthorn, I should add) our community works to bring alive each day and allow for this school to thrive. I will miss the random sausage sizzles or mornings when the stage band welcome us with their lively melodies. What was meant to be the odd (but eventually became the daily) canteen ventures and, of course, most importantly, Ms Beegan's lovely singing. But to miss something is truly a privilege: evidence that you have loved.

And Strathcona has done just that: granted me and each girl the privilege of a second home, a support system, an opportunity that not only advocates for our futures but reminds us that there is a whole community who is cheering us on along the way.

To commemorate this Centenary year, the Class of 2024 has gifted the School with a piece of art featuring the outline of a tree. It will read "a legacy of growth, a future of possibilities", for this display will represent how within and beyond the walls of Strathcona, each girl will continue to inspire, lead and rise.

I will leave with one simple thank you, to Florence Livingstone and Henrietta Hughes, who 100 years ago believed in our potential and our rights, and who took the first step towards lighting up a future for many. And a century later, we hope to continue lighting this legacy, honouring their perseverance to educating women along the way.

Our cross-campus inaugural STEAM Week for Years 5 to 8, themed "Mission: Space," was a vibrant and interdisciplinary success. Students designed lunar habitats, explored space science, and connected with external experts to imagine sustainable futures beyond Earth. Alongside this, we expanded co-curricular offerings in Robotics, eSports, and STEAM Club, ensuring students have opportunities to engage with emerging technologies, collaborative problem-solving, and innovation beyond the classroom.

Professional learning for staff was energised by our ongoing partnership with Dr Ron Ritchhart. Through Action Research Teams, our teachers explored how Cultures of Thinking frameworks can foster deeper learning, curiosity, and engagement. These inquiries were shared at our end-of-year Research Celebration and reflect the strength of our collegial and reflective professional culture.

The Centenary Staff Summit was a defining moment of the year. With keynote speaker, Dr Sophie Fenton, staff explored the future of AI in education, student voice, and the evolving role of teachers in a digital age. This event, alongside our Professional Learning days, re-affirmed our collective vision to educate girls with agency, adaptability, and purpose.

Dr Linda Darling-Hammond affirms, "At the heart of great teaching is a deep care for students and a belief in their potential." In 2024, Strathcona's teachers embodied this commitment, creating conditions for innovation, belonging, and deep learning across every year level and domain.

In Year 9, students engaged deeply in the TC Envision programs: interdisciplinary initiatives that invite learners to explore real-world issues, entrepreneurial thinking, and selfdirected learning. This program encouraged our students to lead their own learning journeys with a strong sense of purpose and possibility.

STUDENT OUTCOMES: **NAPLAN RESULTS**

The National Assessment Program -Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses the capabilities of students in Years 3, 5, 7, and 9, focusing on their literacy and numeracy development. These assessments offer valuable insights to both families and the School, providing a snapshot of student progress at a particular point in time. The results also serve as a reference point for evaluating performance in relation to State and National standards, giving a broader context for student achievement.

In 2024, Strathcona students once again achieved outstanding outcomes in the NAPLAN assessments. On average, our students performed well above State and National benchmarks, reflecting not only their academic capabilities but also their ability to apply learned skills in a formal testing environment. These outcomes are a testament to the ongoing commitment of our students and the unwavering support and expertise of our teaching staff, who nurture each learner's strengths and respond to the diverse learning needs within our classrooms.

The accompanying graphs present a visual representation of Strathcona's strong performance in 2024, clearly illustrating how our students continue to excel academically. These results reaffirm our School's dedication to academic excellence and the holistic development of every learner.






YEAR 3 NAPLAN 2024




YEAR 5 NAPLAN 2024


Governance and **Corporate Structure**

We aim to foster the academic achievement of students at all ability levels and promote excellence in a wide range of co-curricular activities. The School's constitution provides for a Board of Directors. Strathcona Baptist Girls Grammar School is a company limited by guarantee and operates in accordance with the Corporations Act 2001 and Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012.

While the responsibility for the day-to-day management of the School rests with the Principal and her staff, the Board provides:

- » Strategic direction and planning
- » Risk management and oversight
- » Guidance in relation to the development of the School's property planning
- » Approval of the appointment of the Principal and performance appraisals of the Principal


